



DIALOGUE

The aim of dialogue is to gain a better **understanding** of:

- the topic
- other people
- oneself

Dialogue is different from:

- Debate = finding out the best argument
- Negotiation = aiming at an agreement
- Consensus = aiming at unanimity

Dialogue also builds trust and enhances creativity

Method of constructive societal discussion



GROUND RULES OF TIMEOUT DIALOGUE

- •Listen to the others, do not interrupt or start side discussions.
- •Join others' talks and use everyday language.
- •Tell about your own experience.
- •Address the others directly and ask them about their views.
- •Be present and respect others and the atmosphere of trust.
- •Search and build. Work on the emerging conflicts boldly and look for what remains hidden.

Benefits of dialogue

- Equal encounter
- Offering a low threshold of engagement
- Possibility to bring together people with different backgrounds
- Deepening understanding of the topics discussed
- Engaging more extensive expertise
- Listening to voices in the margins and detecting weak signals
- Enhanced commitment to the solutions, joint objective and decision-making
- Increased empathy and trust



Dimensions of dialogical encounters

- Government Citizens
 - Listening to voices not usually heard
- Government Civil Society Organizations
 - Finding common agenda and creating sustainable partnerships
- Citizens Citizens
 - Learning from one another
- Government Government
 - New way of creating shared understanding and trust
